

US History Final Review

The US history final will be composed of 50 true/false questions. For each question you must correctly identify a document/exhibit that supports your answer and explain for why this particular document supports your answer. I will make the documents that can be used on the exam available online.

To get any credit on a question, the answer must be correct and the document must support that answer. Correct answers without correct documentary support will not receive points.

Here is an example of what a question and an appropriate answer might look like:

Sample Question:

The founding fathers believed that majority should be able to make whatever laws it felt appropriate.

Answer to the sample question: False.

Supporting document: Madison's Federalist 10

Explanation: Madison worried that a majority faction might try to strip away the rights of minorities. He argued that preventing this, while protecting the principle of majority rule was one of the great tasks of the American nation.

How should I study?

Review your notes, the class activities we have done, returned tests and (as a last resort) your book to find the definition, significance and context of the following terms. Then, be able to identify the exhibit(s) that are relevant to that term. This review sheet is due on the day of the final and will be worth 30 points.

For each of the exhibits, know its context (unit, time period), and what its argument is.
